
SINULID Threaded Experience

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MESSAGE FROM THE EDITOR

Thirty-four students, twenty-three teachers, four acts—and a fashion show that left some people in (joyful) tears. Sinulid, a culmination of work that has undergone several evolutions, presents the Benilde Fashion Design and Merchandising graduates' work over the last year and a half.

For some of the graduates, the work was completed in months. But for some of these young minds in metamorphosis, it has been an entire lifetime of ideas. Their talents and efforts are apparent. Each approaches the design process uniquely. Some follow a linear method. Others use a more intuitive guiding force.

In documenting this exhibition, we were inspired by the hidden curriculum,* or things that are not said nor seen within the classroom. Knowledge can be gleaned from silent patterns or occurrences on the school premises; even the architecture of a space can reinforce values. The Faculty of the Fashion Design and Merchandising Program is also greatly influenced by the students' daily to-and-fros. What are the values, notions, and learnings from these practically invisible occurrences?

But most important in Sinulid 2025 is the graduates' discoveries about themselves and the world around them. What made them decide what to put forth? Self-exploration was the most crucial aspect, while independent research and mastering technical elements were all part of the journey. One graduate I spoke to mentioned being inspired by his mother and the family business of making salted eggs. Another graduate was all about expressing his gender identity, while another was exploring the grief of the brokenhearted, perhaps the ghosted. These form the "Threaded Experience" that binds the graduates' work together.

With the counsel and occasional handholding of their mentors and teachers, the Sinulid graduates have achieved their best work—so far. It is their first foray into the real world. Will they succeed? They have at least taken baby steps into their futures as fashion designers.

MESSAGE FROM THE FACULTY

Sinulid is the annual graduation collection fashion event of Benilde's Fashion Design and Merchandising students. It showcases Benilde's graduating students' creativity, craftsmanship and innovation. It serves as both a celebration of individual expression and a testament to the collective journey of a diverse group of aspiring designers.

Despite their diverse points of view, design approaches and practices, the students' collections are connected through personal narratives. Each collection reflects their experiences as designers, makers and individuals, shaped by their unique stories. It's not just a fashion event; it's a celebration of individuality, resilience and the unique narratives that define this year's graduating class.

Sinulid reflects the evolving role of fashion as a medium for social commentary and personal expression. The event challenges audiences to rethink the impact of clothing, not just as adornment but as a statement.

Every Sinulid event is different, as each collection is based on current and anticipated trends, societal changes and technological advancements. This year's creative exercise raises new design techniques, Al and other relevant societal discussions.

Teachers provide guidance at every stage. We encourage students to explore their strengths while addressing areas for growth. Above all, we strive to empower students to take ownership of their work, encouraging them to take risks, challenge conventions and trust their creative instincts.

Guiding students through every Sinulid is as much a journey for the teachers as it is for the students. By striking a balance between guiding and stepping back, we empower students to create fashion and discover themselves as designers.





Never in the history of Philippine fashion has there been greater freedom of creativity than now. It is freedom almost infinite that the upcoming generation of fashion designers/fashion creatives has. It is an infiniteness limited only by their imagination, their passion, their willingness to create.

Unlike the previous generations of Filipino fashion designers who were bound by conventions and traditions, by the rules of Western fashion and design, by the limited supply of fabrics and requisite resources, today's aspiring fashion creatives don't necessarily have to be restrained by these. They don't have to follow rules. They make and break their own rules. More important, they don't have to follow the path blazed by their elders. They have no footsteps to follow but theirs.

They can think up the concepts and points of view that originate in their minds or hearts; they don't need history as anchor. No fabrics or garment components? Use bottles, or discards from your mom's closet. Body proportion, classic or modern silhouette, bias or draping—who needs these structures? Technique? It's what they happen to wake up to in the morning, not necessarily what they read or learn in class. The market? They make one, not necessarily the other way around.

To today's generation, knowledge isn't necessarily a book or a class lecture. That is just an option. Knowledge, to them, is their series and sequence of personal moments. The day—or what it brings—is their most reliable teacher.

They march to the beat of their own drum. Do you hear it? You must, whether you're a school or not. You must, if you are to keep this generation.

And—most important, they have a voice. That voice is a self-indulgence allowed them by the older generations—their parents, their teachers and mentors, their authorities.

So to this generation of Benilde's upcoming designers and creatives, seize the day. It is a luxury.

Sinulid is a consistent evidence of that freedom. It is a platform for a generation's creativity without parameters. It is art unbound.



Sinulid is a project for the graduates of the Fashion Design and Merchandising program, by the graduates. It aims to be a movement that reflects not just the graduates' talents and skills but also—as what fashion is supposed to do—the times.

The graduates' works are achieved via a methodology that balances creativity with structured problem-solving. Unconventional ideas are encouraged while frameworks are set in place.

In a confluence of inspirations—from the royalty of a mountain's lore to broken-hearted teens, mermaids' tails and folk healers—the aesthetics in Sinulid are broad and abyssal.

The liberty to create begins. Molded by their thoughts and guided by their teachers, the students present collections that have run vivid in their imaginations for months—sometimes years. They use their hands, heads and hearts to evoke their learning.

They craft with the knowledge of newly acquired skills, they shape and reshape, sew and tear, based on their day-to-day learnings. The result is a personal one, the effect is the opinion of the viewing public.

The exhibition honors each graduate's hard-earned goal. The expanse uplifts the graduates' visions and subtle messages.

Sinulid is tethered to a hands-on, real-world approach. The goal is not to be transient but enduring.

ACT IV


